Décoiffé

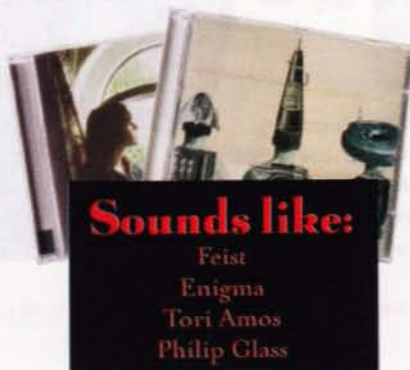

Bare skin

A perfect complexion is key here, but that doesn't mean you can't fake great skin on the sly. Apply Chanel Teint Innocence foundation, \$43, only in spots where you need to even out your skin, and no one will know it's there. Makeup artist and beauty .com spokesperson Tina Turnbow tells me that at VPL's fashion show, she put moisturizer—hold the phone!—over creamy blush so the color would really melt into the models' skin (or try Becca Lip and Cheek Crème in Blossom, \$27). And you can achieve subtle iridescence like the models at Stella McCartney with Fresh Face Luster in Marabella Gold, \$45—just apply lightly to your cheekbones for a similar envy-inspiring effect.
